The Commonwealth Scholarship Commission, United Kingdom has offered Commonwealth Split-Site Doctoral Scholarships tenable in the United Kingdom for the year 2008. These scholarships are available in all disciplines including Medicine and Dentistry.

Eligibility

Citizen and Residency:

Candidates should be citizen of India.

Qualification Requirement: Hold, by 1st October 2008, a first degree of upper second

class Honours standard (or above) or a second class

degree and a relevant postgraduate qualification.

Duration:

12 months

Effective date of award:

The Scholarship will commence from 1st October 2008 in UK.

A copy of the prospectus along with the application form is enclosed. It is also available on the UGC website at www.ugc.ac.in.

You are requested to circulate it amongst the faculty/scholars of the Universities/Institutions/Colleges affiliated to your University. The University is requested to forward not more than five nominations, in order of merit duly recommended by the Vice-Chancellor/Executive Head along with office seal.

The nomination should be sent in the prescribed application form of the Commonwealth Scholarship Commission (in duplicate) together with all the required supporting documents (attested copies or original) so as to reach the University Grants Commission office, Bahadurshah Zafar Marg, New Delhi-110 002 on or before 8th November, 2007, positively. This should be addressed to Mrs.Sushma Rathore, Section Officer (IC-II Section), Room No.505, University Grants Commission, Bahadurshah Zafar Marg, New Delhi-110002. Incomplete applications are liable to be rejected. Direct application from the applicant will not be entertained. The candidate is requested to keep ready 5 copies of her/his application and other supporting documents to be sent to U.K., in case of selection.

It may please be noted that nomination made by the UGC does not automatically guarantee selection or placement in UK and final selection of candidates rest with the Commonwealth Scholarship Commission in United Kingdom.

It may be noted that for 12 months study in the United Kingdom on a Split-site basis must be made in the context of a department/Institutional link with a UK University already in operation or currently under negotiation. Candidates will have the option of one full 12 months period of study or two six months period with a period not greater than 12 months elapsing between each term. Those candidates who have not yet commenced their home Ph.D at the time of application will be eligible to spend a maximum of six months in the UK in the first year of their studies.



INTRODUCTION

Since their inception in 1959, some 25,000 individuals have benefited from the award of Commonwealth Scholarships and Fellowships to pursue advanced academic study in other Commonwealth countries. About two thirds of awards have been tenable in the United Kingdom. The vast majority of award holders have returned to make a significant contribution to their home countries, in many cases at the highest level, making the award scheme one of the largest and most prestigious in the world.

This prospectus describes the Commonwealth Scholarships offered by the Commonwealth Scholarship Commission in the United Kingdom for citizens of other Commonwealth countries in 2008-09. Separate programmes and prospectuses exist for the scholarships offered by distance learning and on a shared funding basis, and for short mid-career fellowships, both academic and professional, offered by the Commonwealth Scholarship Commission. For information on Commonwealth Scholarships offered by other Commonwealth countries, please visit the Commonwealth Scholarship and Fellowship Plan (CSFP) website at www.csfp-online.org

The secretariat of the Commonwealth Scholarship Commission in the United Kingdom is provided by the Association of Commonwealth Universities (ACU), which is responsible for all matters concerning selection and academic studies. The British Council is responsible for payments to scholars, and for arranging travel, reception and other support services for them.

ELIGIBILITY

To apply for the awards covered in this prospectus, candidates should:

- Be Commonwealth citizens, refugees, or British protected persons, and must be permanently resident in a Commonwealth country other than the United Kingdom
- Hold, by 1 October 2008, a first degree of upper second class Honours standard (or above) or a second class degree and a relevant postgraduate qualification, which will normally be a Master's degree
- Be available, by 1 October 2008, to commence their academic studies in the United Kingdom

The Commission wishes to promote equal opportunity, gender equity and cultural exchange. Applications are welcomed from the many different races and origins that comprise the Commonwealth's rich variety of cultures, traditions and institutions.

WHAT TYPES OF AWARD ARE AVAILABLE AND HOW CAN I APPLY?

The Commission invites the nomination of candidates for Commonwealth Scholarships from a number of sources. These are described below. Candidates may choose any of these 'nominating routes' for any category of award, subject to the exceptions noted. Candidates must, however, apply locally in the first instance. The Commission does not accept direct applications.

For the following categories of award...

- 12-36 months' support towards completion of either a full-time
 taught or a doctoral postgraduate qualification at an eligible UK
 institution. These awards are open to those candidates nominated
 either by the Vice Chancellor/Executive Head of their employing
 institution or by the appointed Agency in their home country
- 12 months' non-degree study in the United Kingdom on a split-size basis to, aid the completion of a doctoral degree undertaken at a university in the candidate's home country
- 6 months' clinical training in medicine or dentistry (available only
 to candidates from developing countries). These awards are only
 open to candidates nominated by their Vice Chancellor/ Executive
 Head or by the appointed Agency in the home country

... nominations are invited through the following channels

- The candidate's national Commonwealth Scholarship Agency. This
 is the main route of application and a full list of Commonwealth
 Scholarship agency addresses can be obtained from the CSC website
- The Executive Head of an eligible developing country university on whose staff the applicant serves. (In the case of Bangladesh and India, nominations are made through the University Grants Commission; in Pakistan, through the Higher Education Commission; and in Sri Lanka, through the Secretary, Ministry of Tertiary Education and Training)
- Selected Non-Governmental Organisations or charitable bodies

In addition, the Commission offers:

 Support for study towards an undergraduate degree in the United Kingdom for citizens of the Falkland Islands, Maldives, St Helena and the Seychelles. Nomination is through the national Commonwealth Scholarship Agency

A full list of universities and other organisations invited to nominate can be found on the CSC website. Those wishing to be considered for inclusion in the list of universities and other organisations invited should contact the Executive Secretary of the Commonwealth Scholarship Commission (c/o The Association of Commonwealth Universities, Woburn House, 20-24 Tavistock Square, London WC1H 9HF).

Applications must be submitted on the appropriate application forms, which are available from and must be signed by the nominating authorities listed above. Awards made by the Commission are subject to the ongoing endorsement of the nominating body. The Commission regrets that it is not possible to accept nominations from other organisations, or applications directly from individuals, and that these cannot be acknowledged.

TENURE AND PLACEMENT

Awards are tenable at any approved UK university or higher education institution for a specific programme of study or research and are not restricted to particular subject areas. Awards are to obtain one degree and funding will not be extended to enable candidates to complete an additional or higher qualification than that for which the selection was made. Scholarships are made in respect of **full time** study only and no other courses of study may be undertaken at the same time.

It is important that candidates make clear at the point of application the qualification for which they are applying, especially if they wish to be considered for a scholarship intended to lead to a doctoral degree. This will enable the Commission to consider the application in the correct category.

The final decision on institution of study will be made by the Commission, which reserves the right to overrule any preferences expressed by the candidate at the application stage. Applicants are, however, expected to identify up to three institutions and courses (or supervisors for research degree applicants) that they consider most appropriate on the application form, and explain the reasons for their selection. This is important since the Commission will not change the institution or course for which the candidate has been provisionally selected after the Commission's Selection Committee has met, unless exceptional information becomes available that could not have been foreseen at the time of application. Many courses have strict admission deadlines (particularly at the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge and London) and candidates must take the necessary steps to secure admission to their preferred institutions in advance of any scholarship application to the Commission. Candidates in business, management, economics and other related fields should note that a number of university departments will require a candidate to demonstrate a valid GMAT or GRE score before an offer of admission can be made. Candidates should check admission requirements carefully at the time of application.

Applications for 12 months' study in the United Kingdom on a split-site basis must be made in the context of a departmental/institutional link with a UK university already in operation or currently under negotiation. Candidates will have the option of one full 12 month period of study or two six month periods with a period not greater than 12 months elapsing between each term. Those candidates who have not yet commenced their home PhD at the time of application will be eligible to spend a maximum of six months in the UK in the first year of their studies.

THE SELECTION PROCESS

Nominations for 2008 Commonwealth Scholarships tenable in the United Kingdom are required to arrive with the Commission no later than 31 December 2007. Most nominating authorities will have organised their own competitions in advance of this, with earlier deadlines, that you are strongly advised to check.

In order to ensure a competitive process in the United Kingdom, the Commission normally seeks approximately three times more nominations than there are scholarships available. Following this deadline, each nomination is first considered by a member of the Commission's Panel of Advisers with expertise in the subject area concerned and then by the Commission's Selection Committee in competition with other applicants.

Applications are considered according to the following selection criteria:

- · Academic merit of the candidate
- · The quality of the proposal
- For those candidates from the developing Commonwealth, the likely impact of the work on the development of the candidate's home country or
- For those candidates from the developed Commonwealth, demonstrated or potential leadership qualities

VALUE OF AWARDS

Each scholarship provides:

- Student concessionary or other approved airfare to the United Kingdom and return on expiry of the scholarship (the cost of journeys made before final award confirmation will not normally be reimbursed, nor can fares be paid for a scholar's dependants)
- · Approved tuition and examination fees
- A personal maintenance allowance at the rate of £737 per month (£915 per month for those studying at institutions in the London Metropolitan area)
- A grant towards the expenses of preparing a thesis or dissertation, where applicable
- An initial arrival allowance, incorporating an initial clothing grant for scholars from tropical countries
- A grant for expenses for approved travel within the United Kingdom or overseas
- A grant towards fieldwork costs for those scholars undertaking doctoral studies for whom a case has been made for fieldwork outside the United Kingdom. This shall not normally exceed one economy class return airfare to the fieldwork location
- A paid mid-term fare to their home country for scholars on three
 asygar doctoral awards. Scholars for whom fieldwork faressare
 provided to their home country shall not be entitled to a mid^cterm

fare home, nor scholars who have claimed (or intend to claim) spouse or child allowances for more than 12 months during their award

For married scholars selected by the Commission for awards exceeding one academic year, a marriage allowance of £209 per month is payable provided that the husband and wife are residing together at the same address in the United Kingdom. It is not paid when a husband or wife of the scholar is also in receipt of an award. For such married couples accompanied by their children, a child allowance is payable at the rate of £123 per month for the first child, and £97 per month for the second and third child under the age of 16, provided they are residing with their parents. The Commission's spouse and family allowances represent only a contribution towards the costs of family maintenance in the UK and scholars should expect and be able to supplement these allowances to support family members who choose to come to the UK.

Irrespective of the length of the award, a scholar who is widowed, divorced or a lone parent will receive an allowance in respect of the first accompanying child and child allowances for the second and third accompanying children.

GENERAL CONDITIONS OF AWARD

Applicants should be aware of the following general conditions:

- Candidates will be notified of their provisional selection by the Commission, that is selection for award subject to the Commission agreeing the terms of admission to the university/institution
- Candidates will be given a formal Notification of Award, the offer
 of a scholarship, as soon as terms of admission to the university/
 institution have been agreed


- Formal confirmation of the award will be issued when all conditions
 of the Notification of the Award have been met
- Scholars will be expected to reside in the United Kingdom throughout their award, and to seek prior approval for any proposed visits abroad
- Scholars may not undertake paid employment during their award without prior consent
- The Commission will require a medical report before an award can be confirmed
- Scholars will be required to sign an undertaking to return to their home country as soon as their award comes to an end
- A Commonwealth Scholarship covers fees, fares and personal maintenance. Similar awards may not be held concurrently
- Scholars will be expected to take up the award from the date stated by the Commission in its formal offer of award
- The Commission reserves the right to publish the names of candidates provisionally selected for awards on the CSC website. By applying for an award, the candidate gives consent for such publication in the event that his/her application is successful

ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS

The Commission may require candidates to undertake the ILITS English language test as a condition of eligibility. It is the candidate's responsibility to check with their nominating agency whether this requirement applies to them and to note that an IELTS test will only be considered valid if taken after 1 October 2007 and before 6 March 2008. As a further condition of award, the Commission, or a host institution in the United Kingdom, may require a candidate to take particular English tests and/or training in English.

Applicants in medicine and dentistry whose programme requires them to practise clinically, or to work in a laboratory department reporting on samples from patients, must state how the skills acquired by the training programme will be put into practice post-award. Such applicants can be considered only if they are eligible for registration with the General Medical Council or the General Dental Council. Whilst the Commission does take specialist advice on applications, it should not be assumed that the final selection committee will contain a member with expertise in your precise field.

For both Masters' and doctoral candidates, the degree awarding body must be a UK institution. For Split-Site candidates the degree awarding body must be the cundidates home institution.

Taught Masters' candidates should list their preferred institutions and specific courses. Section 3.3 gives the opportunity to identify areas of particular interest, in which the applicant may specialise as part of the degree dissertation. Words in excess of the prescribed length of 300 words will be ignored.

For Masters' applications, the committee will consider factors including:

- Extent to which the proposed course/institution of study has been well researched (including specific options and dissertation topics, where appropriate) and presented
- Extent to which the choice fits well with the strengths and possible future career of the candidate

In assessing doctoral candidates and candidates for research Masters', particular attention will be paid to the answer to Question 4.5. Words in excess of the prescribed length of 500 words will be ignored. This is important since, in addition to examining the quality of the programme, the committee will wish to see evidence of the candidate's ability to present an argument in a coherent and concise manner.

For doctoral applications, factors taken into account by the committee will include the following:

- Extent to which the project has been well researched and thought out, including where appropriate the identification of an appropriate institution and supervisor
- Degree of innovation in the project
- · Likely impact of the project
- Clarity of the proposal
- Relevance and timeliness to the field of study
- Feasibility of the project, and likelihood that it can be completed in the period proposed

In assessing split-site candidates, particular attention will be paid to the answer to Question 5.4. Words in excess of the prescribed length of 750 words will be ignored.

For split-site applications, it is essential to:

- Include a clear timetable to describe the work that will be completed prior to your travel to the UK and what will be undertaken at the UK institution
- Outline the timetable for completion of your PhD after your return home
- Justify the added value that the time in the United Kingdom will give to your home PhD

Factors taken into account by the committee will also include the following:

- Extent to which the project has been well researched and thought out, including where appropriate the identification of an appropriate institution and supervisor
- Likely impact of the project

For Split-Site Awards the Commission normally offers one year of full-time study in the UK as part of a PhD that the Scholar is and remains registered for at an institution in their home

country. Where required, a Scholarship may be made available for two six-month periods with a period of not greater than 12 months elapsing between each term. Please note that the Commission will only fund the period of study spent in the UK (up to a maximum of 12 months) and the qualification gained will be from the institution of registration in the Scholar's home country. It is not possible for joint degrees to be awarded or for registration to be transferred to the UK institution or for a qualification to be gained from the UK institution.

Note 10: Proposed Institution of Study

Candidates are expected to have undertaken appropriate research on suitable courses and institutions of study prior to submitting their application. Where appropriate, please indicate the name of the particular course identified, as well as that of the institution.

Although every effort is made to take account of candidate's preferences, it is stressed that the final decision on institution of study will be made by the Commission, which reserves the right to overrule any preferences expressed at the application stage.

Please note that the Commission will be unable to take into account any change of preference notified by the candidate after 31 December 2007, unless there are exceptional reasons for this, such as course closure or the transfer of a named supervisor, which could not have been known to the candidate at the time of application.

Note 11: Intellectual Property Rights

Collaboration is a feature of doctoral research. The Commission expects that participants in collaborative projects will develop a collaborative agreement to clarify the contributions and rights of each partner. The Commission will not get involved in negotiating an exploitation agreement, but will need to be assured that an arrangement acceptable to both parties exists.

Arrangements should be made to identify, protect and value any arising Intellectual Property and to secure a suitable return to the institution and the investigators through exploitation. The Commission considers the Intellectual Property ownership to lie initially with the student; however, many universities have their own policy which is locally applicable. In many cases it is in the best interest of the student; for ownership to be vested with the university which will have greater negotiating powers and will be likely to be able to seek the best returns in any exploitation agreement.

Award holders are expected to notify the Commission when Commission-funded Intellectual Property is exploited.

Note 12: Independent Applications to UK universities

In order to help secure admission, carrelidates should make independent applications to UK universities; deadlines may apply equally for entry to taught and research programmes.

Note 13: Alternative institution

Unless otherwise stated, it will be assumed that courses and institutions are listed in order of preference. Candidates who indicate that they are not willing to consider alternatives will be automatically withdrawn from consideration if the institution(s) that they have indicated are deemed inappropriate by the Commission, or are not able to offer a place.

Note 14: Benefit to Your Home Country

As in the case of Note 9, Section Six is particularly important. UK Commonwealth Scholarships for candidates from developing countries are funded by the Department for International Development (DFID). The selection committee will therefore be particularly keen to support proposals that are likely to have a clear benefit for the development of the candidate's home country.

Words in excess of 500 words will be ignored. Answers should demonstrate, in particular, any ways in which the proposed work will increase knowledge about development issues, and promote solutions to poverty reduction in areas such as (among others) public health, education, environment, governance, political, social, economic, scientific or technological development. This section should also make reference to any ways in which the results of your work, or skills acquired during your course, are likely to be implemented. Any link with existing national or regional development plans should be included, as should any relevance to particular DFID programmes. More information on the work of DFID can be found at www.dfid.gov.uk.

The Commission recognises that development benefits can arise from a wide range of subjects, and does not, therefore, seek to restrict applications to specific subject areas. It is, however, the responsibility of each candidate to link their work to development issues. This section will be given a specific grade in assessing your application, and your own arguments will raise or lower your marks. As stated in Note 9, it should not be assumed that all members of the selection committee will be expert in your particular area.

Note 15: Submission of References

The Commission attaches great importance to confidential references from people who are well acquainted with your academic or professional work. Please note that:

- a. Where a candidate has studied at a UK university or is currently doing so, at least one referee should be from the institution concerned
- b. At least two referees should have taught or supervised you on an area of study relevant to this application
- c. For Split-Site awards, one reference must be from the PhD supervisor at the candidate's home institution.

Referees should comment as fully as possible on the candidate, keeping in mind the following points for inclusion, as appropriate:

- a. How long, and in what capacity, you have known the applicant
- b. Your views on the candidate's academic record and suitability for the course in general and need for the particular course of study in the UK
- c. Information on how, and to what extent, the candidate has shown ability in terms of:
 - i. capability to grasp concepts and reason analytically
 - ii. capacity for original thought
 - iii. motivation and perseverance in achieving objectives
- d. Assessment of the candidate's particular strengths and weaknesses
- e. Any other general qualities which you consider would make the candidate a good recipient of a Scholarship

It is the responsibility of candidates to approach referees; it is in your interest to do this promptly since the Commission cannot undertake to consider references arriving after the closing date.
